

Museum Data CoVID-19 Research - Interviews

Participant Information Sheet (PIS)

This is a research project undertaken at the University of Manchester. Before you decide whether to take part, it is important for you to understand why the research is being conducted and what it will involve. Please take time to read the following information carefully before deciding whether to take part and discuss it with others if you wish. About the research

> What is the purpose of the research?

This research concerns how museum professionals use and view data within their professional occupations. As museums are less accessible now, data practices may have changed due to CoVID-19 and this research aims to gather information from an institutional perspective, to create a foundation on which future practice and policy can build on. This research investigates in particular the 'digital first-response frameworks' that have been installed and questions current data handling and usage in museums.

> Will the outcomes of the research be published?

The primary outcome of the research will be qualitative data. This data will be used for future research by the named researcher above. Anonymised data will be made publically available to support future research.

Interviews and outcomes will be included in research and teaching publications.

Who has reviewed the research project?

The project has ethical approval by the University of Manchester.

Who is funding the research project?

This project is funded by an **Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council** (**EPSRC**) studentship award.

What would my involvement be?

What would I be asked to do if I took part?

By participating in this study, you are agreeing to take part in an interview. We anticipate that the participation will take no more than 30 minutes of your time.

Will I be compensated for taking part?

This study is not compensated.

➤ What happens if I do not want to take part or if I change my mind?

It is up to you to decide whether or not to take part. If you choose not to participate in this interview please let the researcher know. If you do decide to take part you will be given this information sheet to keep and will be asked to sign a consent form. If you decide to take part you are still free to withdraw at any time without giving a reason and without detriment to yourself.

If you change your mind once the interview is complete, you may contact the researcher for up to 14 days after your participation and request that your data is withdrawn. After 14 days it will not be possible to remove your data from the project. This does not affect your data protection rights.

If you decide not to take part you do not need to do anything further.

Data Protection and Confidentiality

What information will you collect about me?

In order to participate in this research project we will need to collect information that could identify you, called "personal identifiable information". Specifically we will need to collect:

 Your full name and signature - We will ask you to provide these as part of the process of completing the consent form

Your full name and signature will be stored separately from all other data collected.

Under what legal basis are you collecting this information?

We are collecting and storing this personal identifiable information in accordance with data protection law that protect your rights. These state that we must have a legal basis (specific reason) for collecting your data. For this study, the specific reason is that it is "a public interest task" and "a process necessary for research purposes".

> What are my rights in relation to the information you will collect about me?

You have a number of rights under data protection law regarding your personal information. For example you can request a copy of the information we hold about you.

➤ Will my participation in the study be confidential and my personal identifiable information be protected?

In accordance with data protection law, The University of Manchester is the Data Controller for this project. This means that we are responsible for making sure your personal information is kept secure, confidential and used only in the way you have been told it will be used. All researchers are trained with this in mind, and your data will be looked after in the following way:

- ✓ Data will be stored on an encrypted server and will be backed up to a secure store.

 Paper consent forms will be locked in a secure filing cabinet before being digitized.
- ✓ Experimental data will be shared for research purposes but you will not be identifiable from the data.
- ✓ Experimental data will be used in future research studies.
- ✓ Experimental data will be stored for a maximum of 5 years

When you agree to take part in a research study, the information you provide may be shared with researchers running other research studies in this and other organisations. The future research will be of a similar nature to this research project and will concern museums and digital content. Your information will only be used by this organisation and researchers to conduct research in accordance with <a href="https://doi.org/10.1001/jhearth-project-nature

Please also note that individuals from The University of Manchester or regulatory authorities may need to look at the data collected for this study to make sure the project is being carried out as planned.
