Yeah, I think it really fluctuates between positive and negative. Because I think at the start of the year for me, people were more willing to be on webcams, because it was like an online year, for example, last year. And then funny experiences would happen where like a cat would walk in front of someone's camera, someone's mom came in with like, a plate of fruit. And then you'd see them like, quickly, close the webcam. But but on the other hand, when when everyone had their webcams off, I know that that takes away from the engagement of the class. But I think it kind of also depends on what you're talking about. Because in politics, for example, it gave a bit of freedom, because you can associate someone with their face. So people would talk about people were more willing to talk about things that might have been a bit more controversial, or a bit more debatable, through chat, or through just audio. So sometimes it did speak for the engagement of the class, but sometimes as well, I didn't because everyone was just, if no one spoke up then was less likely that people would say, yes, that was it fluctuate over time. And then they answer the question, but when there is like, again, the breakout room that I can information is, is like a good but, like to have a webcam on there, it would be good thing, because like it feels more like we are in like a one room together. And we are actually solving the problems. And again, as Participant 3 as well pointed out, I also feel like when I'm in the breakout room, and like I'm usually the one engaging the group, because I always found out that I'm the one engaging. So sometimes people just want to talk back, and that's like, yeah, it's just feels a bit weird. Because you're supposed to work on something, but it's like, yeah, this is the one of the things I didn't really like about the remote, like teaching that putting people in the breakouts that don't know each other and like the the you never know what's going to happen. So that was like, that'd be like the positive and negative at the same time. Yeah, but I honestly feel like having to work hands on and in the proper meetings and problem like, like a zoom qualities is definitely good. And like it makes it a more personal space for everybody. And but on the other hand, some again, like pointed out there might be like certain for example, situations where you don't want to have a webcam on and then you're more than willing to come out with like, your own faults on the table. Because that I think that some are some pretty well that when people can associate your opinion that might be like this, this like, nothing bad. But like if there is like something you're trying to explain, or like discuss some some topic and politics, especially I think this applies a lot. That is, I don't know, it's for me, it makes sense that sometimes it could be better idea to not have to look down because people might judge you and there will there is like always people will do that. The tutors have said to us when we first started that they'd prefer webcams on. So it helps us get familiar with each other and get to know one another, especially because with us, there's like 90 in our cohort when we started, even now still faces pop up nd I think, who's that I'm not seeing them here before, but I recognize the name. So it's nice to try and put names to faces. But what we have found is though, that internet connections, the bandwidth, causes lots of problems. I think it's the only downside to that. But it wasn't really explained too much the benefits of why it was just more of a tutor preference that we had webcams on and we just did as we were told.

Um, I think it depends, again, like on the course on people's individual experiences, I not none of my lectures really spoke about webcams, right, right at the start of the Europe COVID Or



right when we transitioned to online, I think midway through the semester, and even more so like the second semester where they really encouraged people to be more engaged, because they saw a lack of engagement because of closed webcams. But at the same time, it wasn't really for like the wider lectures. For like 300 people, it was more so for like the smaller groups, and in breakout rooms, and all the strangers up. People might have their webcams on during the main room, and then just close your webcams in the breakout. Because it's even more intimidating when it's like two or three people instead of 10/20, perhaps. And then what my tutorials and ours would do as well as that, they'd make a point of like having their webcam on. If they say things like if people could join me or if we could turn their webcam on with me. So it's more encouraging that way and not to make them alone. That's talking to like a black screen. Yeah.

But I can I do understand the sentiment, it's just, I think should be more awareness, or I think that in the induction period, they should also mention that if it's for someone to come for, or if it's for privacy reasons that they can, it's more like, oh, it's bad. If you don't, even though it could be either or.



It's harder to going to control the engagement and gauge of reactions as well when you've not got webcams on. So I think they feel probably just as much as pressured as we do. Think that was everything I was going to say.

And yes, I'll just stay and just explain to Participant 1, since he's, since he's just come back in case there's any nuance to it, I hope but no pressure. And so we came to the end of the questions and then we were just we just put it out there for sort of sorts of freephone freeform discussion if there's anything in particular you wanted to raise about your experiences or thoughts on using webcams not using webcams and how this might affect factor engagement. So just if there was anything that you sort of definitely wanted to imput into the project and make sure that that was was here then contributed now as to sort of the chance for you to add anything any any of your own thoughts with questions if you wanted to do that as well .

I can. So so basically from all my experience as a as a student, and then as a also called files facilitator with evictions in COVID. Online. It I feel like it the online, like sessions are quite like a niche thing, because it's like it seems like it's it can be very good for a specific group of people, for example, for PGI as I feel like because they are also familiar with meetings, probably they have to like meet people from overseas that they can really like personally meet that they have zoom and we can zoom them out for a meeting. It's very, very nice for like online conferences, I guess, when there is like a lot of people from different parts of the world. From the university perspective, I feel like it like I mean, we didn't have a choice but there is certain things like lectures, for example, that I for example, wasn't very convinced that the online teaching really worked. Even if it was well done by the person that this is not only the person but like the format how it's like basically done. It was still like less engaging than then than a normal session. But there again, sometimes it happened. And when people had their, their their cams off on lectures, they've been more keen to ask questions, at least in physics, that's a basic, that's my background where I'm coming from. Or maybe there'll be like less afraid to, like, ask or discuss, like certain things because it can come back to what P5 said, having your face out there and asking questions. And, you know, there is always this like, for that like, or asking a

dumb question. But if you don't have the face on you, just your name and your voice, it feels more it feels like easier to ask, if you feel like it question is dumb. Even though like, we all stress out that there is no dumb questions, there is only dumb answers. Maybe even not that sometimes the Yeah, no dumb questions. It's, I feel like people are less afraid to, to ask questions. And but then, again, there is also people who are more likely to answer when they're on the webcam, as actually as, as I said, that they're like, little bit peer pressure to us, like, as are these casts or interacts with the people in the room. So it really depends what the session is, and what's the point of the session. For example, I found that that non interactive session, very can very well online. Because everybody can either turn the webcam on or off, and also their mic, but they don't interact with the facilitator, for example, for I know that some services at the university like cats, or some of these sessions that are non interactive, and I feel like they work very well. In this matter. Yeah, but for example, break shows on physics on like, just the q&a sessions, I feel like, unless there was not like a lot of break from the facilitators side done beforehand, to like, set a structure. For example, I had a professor who specifically said, we'll look at books certain times, if we send him an email, and he made like a one on one. With us, I very much liked that I was in favor, or that there will be professors who just like put us in, like, a room, all of us. And then, you know, some people don't feel comfortable asking, it's like academic question. Some people just need like that one on one time. Because, I mean, they are here at the university. And I feel like everybody's should have that chance to, to have like that office hour with somebody or like, ask questions, one on one with the professor. So that's like, different points of view from different academic, like, positions, I would say, as a as a as like biotech, which for university at the same time as a student as as well. So thanks. He makes a very good point. I've actually got a lecture this afternoon on Hypno birthing, I'm a student midwife. And what they've put on Blackboard, as part of the notes for that is get yourself comfortable, because we'll be going through that. So I'm thinking if it was in a classroom environment, it would be a bit more awkward. Whereas I've got the comfy chair here, I can relax and really engage with that lecture. But we've had some lectures, like on knowledge and research is one of my units at the moment, which is part of the reason why I was quite keen on doing this, by the way. It's just blank white PowerPoint with right black text, there's no images, there's nothing like that on. And I'm finding it so difficult to engage into it. Because it's I mean, for the most part, it's pre recorded as well. And every couple of weeks, we have a live lecture. And the way she just goes over them same PowerPoint slides, and it's like, no, not this again. And I think that it'd be better in a classroom environment, where it's like, raw data. It's not. I don't want to say it's not fun, but it isn't. But yeah, I definitely think it's the lectures. The other thing I was going to add as well, because I'm obviously with that our sciences have been with midwives. I think like the online lectures are good. With webcams on or not, with the changes in how healthcare, a lot of GPs and things at the moment is via email, you pop them a message through an app or something now you don't have much telephone things. And we don't know if we'll ever have a full lockdown to it. We could have another like 10 years or so another pandemic with another virus, but hopefully touchwood doesn't happen but

you never know in this day and age now. But I think then with us it helps prepare us for that, that that environment you know, if we go back on lockdown again, do we do antenatal appointments online? And I think then with webcams with complete strangers that will be more are daunting as well, you know, if you're there in uniform and everything. So I think from that perspective, it does set us up for the future as well.
